CHARACTERS

The love story is centered around Fern Taylor and Ambrose Young. Do you consider them the only main characters in this novel or do you think there are others who play a pivotal and influential role? If so, who and why?

Do you think the characters were realistically portrayed? Describe these character's personalities, motivations, inner qualities.

How does the way the characters see themselves, differ from how others see them? How do you see the various characters?

What did you think about their attraction to each other? What drew them in? What did you think of their fast relationship?

What is motivating the actions of the characters in the story? What do the sub-characters want from the main characters and what do the main characters want with them?

Were there any moments where you disagreed with the choices of any of the characters? What would you have done differently?

What past influences are shaping the actions of the characters in the story?

How did Fern's eavesdropping shape her view of her world?

What was your reaction to the conversation between Fern and Ambrose about God?

Through the beginning of the book Ambrose either didn't notice Fern, was angry with her, or avoided her. When do you think Ambrose realized he had feelings for Fern?

Why do you think Ambrose chose to not dance with Fern at the dance?

Why do you think Fern and Ambrose never ever exchanged letters while he was away at war?

When do you think Ambrose decided to really live again?

What does Fern mean when she says, "It's not that there aren't answers, it's that we wouldn't understand them if we had them."?

Bailey has Muscular Dystrophy and is expected to die young . . . do you think he is afraid of death? Why or why not?

Bailey and Fern had learned to "live in the moment," so to speak - because the future wasn't necessarily promised, due to Bailey's illness. In that way, Bailey's death allowed Fern to move forward with her own life, sad as that is. He freed her to move on. Do you agree with this statement?

The wrestling gym became a sanctuary for Ambrose. He said he could feel them there . . . hear them. What do you think they were saying to him? What answers was Ambrose seeking?

Why do you think Fern picked Kite and Ambrose picked Balloon? What did each choice say about their different experiences in life? Given the choice, which would you choose and why?

Who did you like best? And who do you like the least? Why?

Did any of the characters remind you of yourself or someone you know? How?

What were the dynamics of "power" between the characters? How did that play a factor in their interactions?

Do the main characters change by the end of this novel? Do they grow or mature? What events trigger such changes?

What do you think will happen next to the main characters?

THEMES, DEFINITIONS & SYMBOLISM

Beauty

noun

a combination of qualities, such as shape, color or form, that pleases the aesthetic sense, especially the sight

"True beauty, the kind that doesn't fade or wash off, takes time. It takes incredible endurance. It is the slow drip that creates the stalactite, the shaking of the Earth that creates mountains, the constant pounding of the waves that breaks up the rocks and smooths the rough edges. And from the violence, the furor, the raging of the winds, the roaring of the waters, something better emerges, something that would have otherwise never existed.

And so we endure. We have faith that there is purpose. We hope for things we can't see. We believe there are lessons in loss, power in love, and that we have within us the potential for a beauty so magnificent, our bodies can't contain it."

When Fern and Ambrose bury the dead spider, Fern says a prayer and thanks God for "making even ugly things beautiful". Beauty (both physical and inner) is a big part of the book. Is physical beauty a blessing or a curse? Why? And the opposite . . . Is the absence of physical beauty a blessing or curse?

Why do you think Ambrose's identity is so tied up in his appearance?

Ambrose is very self-conscious of his scars when he returns. Why do you think it was so easy for Fern to look past the scars and love him even though he didn't have the same beautiful face?

Would the story end differently if Fern did not suffer from Ugly Girl Syndrome? Or did life with Bailey shape her into a better person so she could reach out to Ambrose and see him as still beautiful?

Fern believes she is ugly. She describes herself in an unflattering way at the beginning. She can see beauty in everyone except herself. Why do you think she finally starts to see herself in a better light? Does Ambrose unknowingly help her?

Heroism

"Victory is in the battle."

This is a very powerful quote from the book. What are your thoughts about it? Each of the characters, Fern, Ambrose and Bailey, show heroism in the book. When and how?

Why do you think Ambrose's friends decided to join the army with him?

If Ambrose were to come back from war with his friends. Would he have went looking for Fern?

How would the story have changed if Ambrose didn't get hurt? And what about Bailey? What if he didn't suffer from MD?

QUOTES

"If God makes all our faces, did he laugh when he made me? Does he make the legs that cannot walk and eyes that cannot see? Does he curl the hair upon my head 'til it rebels in wild defiance? Does he close the ears of the deaf man to make him more reliant? Is the way I look coincidence or just a twist of fate? If he made me this way, is it okay, to blame him for the things I hate? For the flaws that seem to worsen every time I see a mirror, For the ugliness I see in me, for the loathing and the fear. Does he sculpt us for his pleasure, for a reason I can't see? If God makes all our faces, did he laugh when he made me?"

Would you rather be blind or deaf? Why?

Would you rather be smart or beautiful? Why?

What surprised you the most about the book?
